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Inspiring Stories



Amid the daily flurry of caseloads, activity and burdens, it's easy for workers in the field of family and juvenile justice to lose sight of the difference they can make in someone's life. **You Can Make a Difference: Stories from Juvenile Court** is a poignant collection of stories on audio CD illustrating the work of the Juvenile Court by the people who work there. Judges, probation officers, police, child dependency workers, lawyers, and others in juvenile and family justice tell stories that show how those in the field of family and juvenile justice have impacted others and made a difference. They also relate stories of how others have influenced them. A retired police officer from Pennsylvania tells the story of how his older brother convinced him to enter a boxing ring to fight a one-punch, knock out fighter. Throughout his life and career as a police officer, he met his challenges based on this philosophy that it is better to win or lose in the ring than to lose in the dressing room. Another story is told by a juvenile court officer who felt that finding the right placement for a child was her most important and challenging job. She placed a 9-year-old boy, who had been in a mental health facility and had all his belongings in a garbage bag,

in a group home for boys where he flourished. A juvenile court judge tells the story of a law school experience where he observed a juvenile case where the offender was 17 years old and was considered for a transfer to adult court. His crime was knocking down an elderly woman in a parking lot and taking her purse. Though she suffered a broken hip and arm, the victim appealed for mercy because she felt the young offender was salvageable because he was an honor roll student and active in school. The juvenile court judge listened to the victim, kept the case in juvenile court, and handed down a sentence of 1,000 community service hours. The boy later graduated from high school and is now in law school.

This inspiring audio-CD is 64 minutes in length and is presented by the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges.

VIDEOS

V2644 **Childbirth** (video, 70 minutes, 2002)

Emergency medical responders are expected to be able to bring a sense of order and assistance to what can be a fast-paced and sometimes risky natural occurrence. Segment one of this program on childbirth focuses on how a well-prepared EMT can facilitate the normal birth of a child. Segment two covers some of the more common complications of childbirth such as umbilical cord prolapse and abnormal presentations (i.e. not head first). The *Pulse Plus* segment of this program covers third trimester complications of pregnancy including placenta previa, abruptio placenta and eclampsia. (Primedia Workplace Learning)

V965 **Emergency Medical Update: Volume 3, Number 2** (video, 42 minutes, 1989)

Focused on childbirth, this video covers: normal childbirth, anatomy and physiology of pregnancy and birth, childbirth complications, neonatal resuscitation, and delivering a baby. (Lockert-Jackson and Associates)

V2292 **Have a Healthy Baby: Labor and Delivery** (video, 30 minutes, 1991)

This video presents some of the options available for childbirth, through the experiences of two couples. One of the mothers uses no medication; the other requires an epidural and pushes from a squatting position. The program includes animated sequences of the birth process. (Visual Education Centre)

V2106 **Obstetrics & Gynecological Emergencies** (video, 62 minutes, 1998)

Segment one discusses the pathophysiology of abdominal pain in females such as dysmenorrhea, mittelshmerz, pelvic inflammatory disease, and ruptured ovarian cyst. Segment two demonstrates neonatal resuscitation procedures, discusses the inverted pyramid of treatment, shows proper equipment and supplies for the neonatal patient, and explains what APGAR is and how it is used with the newborn. Segment three focuses on the possible complications that may occur during pregnancy and delivery. Segment four shows how to manage a tubal pregnancy. The *Hands-on-Training* segment discusses how to deliver a baby and what the first responder should expect when responding to a woman-in-labor call. (Primedia Workplace Learning)

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- V2772** **American Heat, March 2003: Metropolitan Profile — Philadelphia Fire Dept.**
(video, 74 minutes, 2003)
- This episode goes inside the fifth largest (and one of the oldest) American fire departments, the Philadelphia Fire Department. It features the organizational structure, fireground operations, their ARFF Training Centre, EMS operations, and fire prevention programs. This training package is designed to assist departments in developing their own organization profile, with particular emphasis on large-scale incident response. The *Back to Basics* segment reviews basic firefighting skills and presents exercises to test firefighters in a controlled setting. (American Heat, Inc.)
- V2652** **For the Sake of Our Children: A Video Guide to Child Protection Law in BC**
(video, 12 minutes, 2000)
- Designed to educate viewers about the rights of children to a safe home environment, emphasize parents' rights in child apprehension situations, provide the resources available to aboriginal families and explain what the parents can do if their child is taken. (Legal Services Society, Public Legal Education Program)
- V2745** **Hazardous Materials** (video, 66 minutes, 2003)
- Emergency medical responders are a vital component of an emergency response to any type of hazardous materials release. The first segment of this program provides an overview of the entire Hazmat incident response system. Segment two covers exposure or contamination of the human body, including routes of entry into the body. Segment three focuses on the importance of protocols for hazardous materials exposure incidents. The *Pulse Plus* segment covers personal protective equipment and rehabilitation of personnel. (FETN)
- V2734 &** **Hazards of Concrete Construction** (2 videos, 28 minutes each, 2000)
V2735
- This two part program demonstrates the hazards of buildings made of concrete. Frank Brannigan shows different types of concrete construction and the special challenges each present on the fireground. (Primedia Workplace Learning)
- V2744** **The Importance of In-Service Training** (video, 22 minutes, 2002)
- This program stresses the importance of in-service training to corrections staff and illustrates the various reasons why in-service training is important to the staff member and to the organization. (Lockup USA)
- V2723** **Man vs. Heavy Metal** (video, 62 minutes, 2002)
- Demonstrates the proper techniques for responding to heavy equipment medical calls, in both the industrial and agricultural fields. Instructions include scene safety, size-up, packaging and transporting a "man vs. heavy metal" medical call. The *Pulse Plus* segment discusses medical concerns surrounding possible field amputations. (FETN)
- V2642** **The Mission School Syndrome [Sequel]** (video, 66 minutes, 1993)
- This sequel to the 1988 program of the same title (V1150) describes the role of mission schools in the education of native children from the 1920s to the 1980s, and addresses the long-term impact on native communities. It looks at the efforts being made around the Yukon by native individuals and communities to repair some of the damage done by the schools and to turn their lives around. (Distributed by Filmwest Associates)

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- V2687** **Mountie: Canada's Mightiest Myth** (video, 46 minutes, 1998)
This video traces the history of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the evolution of the Mountie as a larger-than-life figure, from its 1873 origins on the Canadian frontier to the hit TV series "Due South" and the merchandising of the Mountie image. Juxtaposing film and TV clips with dramatic re-creations and archival news footage, the program pits Hollywood myth against Canadian reality, illustrating how mass media images simplify the real world of the Mounties. (National Film Board of Canada)
- V2682** **Safely Clearing Intersections — Code 3** (video, 8 minutes, 1998)
This program outlines the proper methods and techniques for clearing an intersection safely while responding Code 3. The program is designed to draw attention to the conditions most often encountered when attempting to cross intersections while operating under emergency conditions and to help officers develop a safer approach to executing this maneuver. (Distributed by Canadian Learning Company)
- V2655** **Stopping Traffik: The War Against the War on Drugs** (video, 47 minutes, 1999)
Since 1982 when Ronald Reagan declared a war on drugs, the international trade in black market drugs has grown into a multi-billion dollar industry. Now a new clarion is being heard as the war against the war on drugs gains support. Leading the crusade is a coalition of unlikely allies: outspoken cops, wealthy businessmen, social activists and medical professionals. They contend that stopping the traffic in human misery lies in decriminalizing drug use and treating addiction as a medical problem, not a crime. From Vancouver to Liverpool to Zurich, this program looks at experiments and programs that would seem to give merit to this growing campaign. (CBC International Sales)
- V2690** **Stress: The Hidden Threat** (video, 60 minutes, 2001)
A panel discussion of emergency services personnel, family support service workers, the Red Cross and emergency mental health workers on the impact of terrorism on fire, rescue and law enforcement personnel and their families. Suggestions are offered to help people through troubled times. The discussion was conducted within two weeks of the September 11, 2001 attacks on the United States. (Distributed by Chevron Publishing Corporation)
- V2688** **Tough Guise: Violence, Media, and the Crisis in Masculinity** (video, 57 minutes, 1999)
Jackson Katz systematically examines the relationship between images of popular culture and the social construction of masculine identities in the United States. He argues that widespread violence in American society, including the school shootings in Colorado, Arkansas, and elsewhere need to be understood as part of an ongoing crisis in masculinity. In this abridged version, the historical context, overall argument and evidence have been condensed, and spoken obscenities and visible nudity have been removed. (Distributed by Kinetic Video).
- V2680** **Waging Peace: A Year in the Life of Caledonia Jr. High** (2 videos, 33 + 39 minutes, 2001)
Caledonia Junior High has the reputation of a tough school; Edy Guy-Francois, the new principal, is determined to change that. Facing violence and disrespect, she starts with stricter, more even-handed enforcement of school rules, support for the teaching staff, and the introduction of a peer mediation program. Monthly school dances, a successful winter carnival, and recognition of student accomplishment improve morale, and students begin to work in groups on projects that they feel will address their concerns. Caledonia becomes a different school, and one the students are proud of. (National Film Board of Canada)
