- D457 **American Heat, July 2007: Energetic Materials Identification and Response**
(DVD, 30 minutes)
This program assists the responder in being able to evaluate and respond effectively to terrorism incidents that involve energetic materials. It supplies basic information concerning explosive and incendiary devices that could be used as terrorist weapons. It discusses specific actions required for a safe and effective response to incidents involving energetic materials. In addition, this program provides information regarding the threat of suicide bombings. (American Heat) (TH 9310.5 A443 2007 JUL)

- D591 **American Heat, March 2008: Medical Response to Terrorism** (DVD, 30 minutes)
This program covers medical response to terrorism and provides some suggestions on how to help fire crews prepare for such an event. The terrorist threat as it relates to the fire service is described. The program looks at basic triage tactics firefighters may need to perform during a terrorism incident response. Finally, the program describes community resources such as the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) and Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) and how to utilize them. (American Heat) (TH 9310.5 A443 2008 MAR)

- D465 **Could a Russian School Siege Happen Here?** (DVD, 31 minutes)
The 2004 siege by Chechen rebels of a Russian elementary school resulted in the deaths of 323 hostages, including 156 children. Most law enforcement analysts agree that it is not a matter of whether, but when it will happen in the US. This program examines the preparations to be taken in anticipation of such an event. It identifies concerns faced by law enforcement in the event of an intruder assault on a school and strategies to prepare for and respond to such an event. It discusses ways to identify and prevent terrorist / intruder action. It also identifies the roles of civilians in preparing for and responding to such an event. - D239 **Emergency Response to Terrorism: Training for Emergency Responders**
(DVD, 134 minutes)
The threat of terrorism is a growing concern throughout the world. While we cannot always stop a terrorist attack, it is important to recognize these situations when they occur and be trained, equipped, and ready to respond. Emergency responders may be confronted with mass casualties, contamination, hazardous materials, trapped victims, a crime scene, and the dreaded secondary device targeted at responders. This DVD contains all six ODP training videos that are designed to increase the awareness and knowledge of emergency responders, enhance their safety, and ultimately help them effectively meet today's challenges involving emergency response to terrorism. - D1290 **Signs of a Terror Attack: Critical Basics for Beat Cops** (DVD, 31 minutes)
The street officer has become the first line of defense in stemming the tide of terrorist activity. This program looks at ways officers can spot terrorist activity. They will become familiar with types of weapons that can be used along with items that can be used for making explosives. (In the Line of Duty) (HV 6432 S546 2011)
- D196 **Terrorism DVD** (DVD, 10 minutes)
The threat of terrorism, from domestic sources and from abroad, has become another factor to consider when responding to a hazardous materials incident. This program covers preparedness, such as being aware of the local community and recognizing suspicious activities within it; and response to a terrorist incident, including what to do and what not to do. The program highlights the differences in a terrorist situation versus a regular hazardous materials response, particularly the nature of it being a crime scene and the potential for first responders themselves to be targets. - D1080 **Terrorism and Homeland Security** (DVD, 52 minutes)
Chief John Norman discusses the fire department's role in terrorism and homeland security, and firefighters' unique position to thwart terrorists' plans in order to keep ourselves, our families, and our country safe. He looks at the following: the history of terrorist activities on American soil; how terrorist tactics have changed over the years; and responding to terrorist attacks such as dirty bombs, chemical attacks, and biological incidents. - V2302 **American Heat, April 2000: Terrorism: The First-In Response Team**
(video, 62 minutes)
The purpose of this lesson is to inform every company officer of the potential of terrorist acts in the incidents that they respond to. The video features two segments on the Oklahoma City bombing of April 19, 1995. The growing threat of Anthrax is also examined. The Firefighter II Training segment of this program is part 2 of truck company operations, vertical ventilation. (American Heat) (TH 9310.5 A443 2000 APR)
- V2589 **American Heat, November 2001: Inside the Pentagon 9/11/01** (video, 63 minutes)
Using the experience of the September 11, 2001 terrorism attack on the Pentagon, this program provides information for the firefighter and fire officer to better prepare to respond to catastrophic events. It focuses on incident behavior to increase the safety of the fire company during emergency response. The Firefighter II segment is on fire service hydraulics rules of thumb, part three. (American Heat) (TH 9310.5 A443 2001 NOV)
- V1851 **American Heat, September 1997: Bomb Scares, Bomb Threats and Bomb Explosions** (video, 79 minutes)
This month's theme is violence against responders. The program addresses the role that bombs and terrorism play on a daily basis. The survival Training segment is on ground ladders, part 1 (American Heat) (TH 9310.5 A443 1997 SEPT)
- V2968 **American Heat, September 2004: Terrorist vs. Firefighter** (video, 88 minutes)
This episode examines firefighters' roles when responding to a terrorist event. This program follows two fire departments on training exercises based on terrorist events. It also looks at some of the more devastating terrorist attacks in the last 10 years and discusses ways to better prepare for such an incident locally. It addresses the particular themes of scale, duration, and range of hazards. The Survival training segment covers sub-floor rescue techniques, part two (American Heat) (TH 9310.5 A443 2004 SEPT)
- V3036 **Constant Threats: Terrorism and Disasters** (video, 53 minutes)
This course reviews the most current issues pertinent to EMS in terms of terrorism and disaster-relief issues. It includes an update on ricin, providing essential information on this toxic protein and actions and precautions to take when treating ricin victims. (Primedia Workplace Learning) (RA 645.5 C668 2005)
- V3181 **Land Transportation Security Technology** (video, 30 minutes)
This program will acquaint you with hidden hazards of some modern terrorist incidents and outline the steps for an effective and safe response. (National Institute of Justice) (HV 6432 L268 1999)
- V2690 **Stress: The Hidden Threat** (video, 60 minutes)
A panel discussion of emergency services personnel, family support service workers, the Red Cross and emergency mental health workers on the impact of terrorism on fire, rescue and law enforcement personnel and their families. Suggestions are offered to help people through troubled times. The discussion was conducted within two weeks of the September 11, 2001 attacks on the United States. (Emergency Education Network) (BF 575 S75 S768 2001)

- V2340 **Surviving the Secondary Device: The Rules Have Changed** (video, 12 minutes)
This video on bombing incidents discusses the situation where a secondary explosive device is used after the primary explosion. The secondary device is usually intended to harm first responders as they are helping the injured. A step by step process for planning against this situation is described. A number of examples of actual events and how first responders reacted to the situations are discussed. (Jernigan Productions) (HV 6640 S977 1997)
- V1924 **Terrorism: 1st Response** (video, 28 minutes)
Designed for law enforcement, fire departments, EMS and other emergency management personnel, this is a training resource for those most likely to be first on the scene of a terrorist attack. Topics include: categories of terrorist weapons, profiling potential targets, preserving and documenting evidence, establishing the perimeter, triage, incident command, and hazmat protocols. (Emergency Film Group) (HV 6431 T473 1997)
