ESMS-1300 Foundations of Emergency Management 1: Planning & Preparedness (Required in Diploma and Degree)	Explore the roles of planning and preparedness in emergency management. Examine the history and evolution of emergency management, as well as key concepts and principles that underpin successful preparation and planning. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, completing a basic Hazard/Risk/Vulnerability Assessment, completing a group presentation, and completing a research paper.</i>	\$502.62
ESMS-2210 Introduction to Information Management (Required in Diploma and Degree) Prerequisites: ESMS-1200 and ENGL-1100	Explore information technology and knowledge management theory and practice as an essential element of business in today's digital economy. Learn about information systems and technology and the role of information systems in making organizations more efficient. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, authoring three memo's using business writing, completing a research paper, and completing a final exam.</i>	\$502.62
ESMS-2300 Foundations of Emergency Management 2: Response & Recovery (Required in Diploma and Degree) Prerequisites: ESMS-1300 and ENGL-1100	Building on Foundations of Emergency Management I: Planning & Preparedness, explore the theoretical frameworks and applied models related to emergency/disaster response and recovery. Learn about typical challenges to response and recovery efforts, as well as strategies to promote disaster resilience for the future. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, completing three quizzes, developing a research proposal, completing a research paper, and completing a group presentation.</i>	\$502.62
ESMS-2400 Introduction to Risk Management (Required in Diploma and Degree) Prerequisite: ENGL-1100	Learn core risk management principles, concepts and models. Explore critical considerations, including risk perception and tolerance as well as basic risk management strategies. <i>Students are graded on participating in discussion boards, completing a risk assessment, authoring a reflection paper, and developing an infographic.</i>	\$502.62

<p>ESMS-2500 Crisis Communications (Required in Diploma and Degree) Prerequisites: BUSN-1100 and ENGL-1100</p>	<p>Explore the role of the safety, security, and emergency management professional in crisis communications. Learn how to create a crisis communications plan that meets corporate needs and expectations. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, completing two quizzes, authoring a paper on a case study, working with a group to develop a presentation, and authoring a research paper.</i></p>	<p>\$502.62</p>
<p>ESMS-4300 Current Trends in Security & Disaster Management (Required Degree Only) Prerequisites: RESM-2100 and ENGL-1110</p>	<p>Explore current topics and research in security and disaster management, including health emergency management, climate change, cyber security, impacts of social media, and disaster management from a global perspective. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, authoring materials for a term paper including a problem statement, annotated bibliography, and final term paper, and delivering a presentation.</i></p>	<p>\$502.62</p>
<p>ESMS-4310 Resilience & Recovery (Required Degree Only) Prerequisites: ESMS-2300 and ESMS-2310 and ENGL-1110</p>	<p>Analyze theories of resilience, as well as lessons learned from disasters around the world. Examine ways to build resiliency and the role building resiliency capacity plays in all phases of emergency management. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, developing a research question and literature review, analyzing a case study, and completing a research paper.</i></p>	<p>\$502.62</p>
<p>ESMS-4340 Advanced Business Continuity Management (Required Degree Only) Prerequisites: ESMS-2340 and ESMS-2400 and ENGL-1110</p>	<p>Examine the applications for business continuity planning; develop, implement, and evaluate an enterprise business continuity program; and evaluate the effectiveness of business recovery team operations, using case studies as models. <i>Students are graded on participation in discussion boards, authoring a short paper, completing a reflective paper, and working with a team to develop a report.</i></p>	<p>\$502.62</p>
<p>FIRE-2125 Leading Inclusive Cultures (Required Degree Only)</p>	<p>This course is designed to increase Emergency Services professionals (including fire, police, paramedics; corrections, emergency management, victim services personnel; sheriffs, court officers, and bylaw enforcement officers) ability to lead diverse workforces, within multicultural communities. It draws on lessons learned by businesses, about how to draw value from diverse workforces to improve service to all clients.</p>	<p>\$680.70</p>

PSAD-4900 BPSA Capstone Project *Restricted to BPSA students	The capstone project involves students applying and synthesizing the theory, concepts, and principles learned throughout their undergraduate studies. BUSN-1101 Human Resources Management (Required Diploma and Degree)	Learners will be able to incorporate legislation and organizational policy requirements into the development and implementation of strategies and practices that maintain and build the safety, security, and privacy of employees and their information.
