ABORIGINAL GATHERING PLACE

FORMING STRONG CULTURAL IDENTITIES IN AN INTERSECTING SPACE OF INDIGENEITY AND AUTISM

ABOUT:

This participatory action research project will support Indigenous Autistic students to:

- Strengthen cultural identities in an intersecting space of Indigeneity and Autism within post-secondary education.
- Teach the teacher what better supports the identity and success of an Indigenous Autistic student in post-secondary.
- Use digital storytelling to inform Indigenized and decolonized teaching and learning practices to promote better equity, diversity, and inclusion in education.

STUDENT RESEARCHERS MUST:

- Be an adult 18+ who self identifies as both Indigenous (First Nations, Métis, or Inuit) and Autistic/Person with Autism. We are inclusive of mixed racial identity.
- Be a student enrolled in a post-secondary institute.
- Be committed to advancing human rights and social justice for Indigenous and Autistic Peoples.

This research project, JIBCER2021-03-FSCI, is approved by JIBC's Research Ethics Board.

RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Join scheduled online meetings (camera use optional).
- Use digital storytelling to share about your post-secondary experience.
- Collaborate with a team consisting of Indigenous and Autistic Peoples, Elders, Knowledge Keepers, and Educator-Allies.
- Awareness of role, rights, and responsibilities as a student participant as outlined in this research project's consent.
- Commit to 14 hours of paid participation. \$25.00/hr April 2022-June 2022.

With Sage Lacerte of the Moose Hide Campaign, the OI and Resident Elders held a virtual space in observation of the National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls (MMIWG). This sacred circle was to raise awareness and make visible the ongoing crisis of gender-based violence and genocide of Indigenous women and girls and introduce the Moose Hide Campaign, a grassroots national campaign to end violence towards women and children. Together we honour, respect, and remember our lost and stolen sisters and relatives, their families, loved ones, and communities.
