Primary Responsibilities:

Teaching and Instructional Delivery:

- Work collaboratively with other faculty to deliver all portions of the PCP program;
- Delivers program instruction within the pre-determined curriculum;
- Uses a variety of proven instruction methods based on an applied experiential learning model;
- Orients and mentors new faculty;
- Provides written and verbal feedback to the students;
- Meets with students to review strengths and weaknesses;
- Conducts student evaluations
- Documents student progress for student records;
- Identifies 'at-risk' students and directs them to the Lead Instructor or appropriate Student Support Services;
- Participates in PCP faculty meetings as required.

- Participates in the organizing and care of program equipment and ambulances.
- Conducts student logbook reviews and meets with students to review competency attainment/signoff.
- Performs related duties, as assigned.

Qualifications & Requirements:

- Minimum: PCP or equivalent certification/diploma.
- Completion of the JIBC Essential Skills for Training and Facilitation (INDC-1110) course or other equivalent teaching certification. A Provincial Instructor Diploma (or equivalent) would be considered an asset for this position. A related post-secondary diploma or degree would also be considered an asset.
- A minimum of 3 years' experience at a PCP level (or higher).
- Previous teaching or training experience.
